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State wants to borrow \$1.4B

The state wants to borrow up to \$1.4 billion to help pay unpaid bills, even as the federal government approved sending more than \$775 million a year over the next five years to help care for Medicaid patients. The short-term borrowing means businesses waiting months to be paid should get at least some of their money soon. But the state is just exchanging one kind of debt for another. It will have to pay off the \$1.4 billion loan by the end of the fiscal year in June 2009, 4B
